Chesterfield County Parks and Recreation, in partnership with the Chesterfield Historical Society of Virginia, invites you to visit the Chesterfield County Museum, 1892 Historic Jail and Magnolia Grange located in the county government complex.

Chesterfield County Museum

The museum serves as a replica of the first colonial courthouse built in 1750. Museum exhibits include Powhatan Indian culture, artifacts from America's first iron furnace



and coal mines, historic Civil War relics and artifacts from early Chesterfield colonial life. Explore a reproduction of an early 20th century General Store and view the new changing exhibit "Chesterfield's Picture Postcard Past" on display till August 31. For details, call 768-7311. 1892 Historic Jail

This historic jail precedes several earlier jails that once stood on the Courthouse Green. It has been restored and is currently open to the public for group tours which start at the County Museum next door. View a new exhibit focusing

Magnolia Grange


This Federal-style plantation house built in 1822 was named after the circle of Magnolia trees that once graced its front


